Read Joshua 24:14-17

Cast all your anxiety on him, because he cares for you. 1 Peter 5:7 (NRSV)

As a minister, I recently received an appointment to a new congregation. I was packing and waiting for the big change in my life when I saw my grandmother's old watch, which she had received from her father. It was more than 60 years old and still working.

The evening before leaving my home for the last time, I thought about my life and recalled the life of my grandmother. Word of life

Read Romans 8:1-4

'If you love me, you will keep my commandments.' John 14:15 (NRSV)

I was not excited to hear that the Ten Commandments were to be our topic of study for the next few weeks. I thought, 'Surely, as we are now in the New Testament era, all these laws are behind us?'

Then I recalled reading about a man who became a Christian while in prison. When he was released, he went into a church for the first time in his life. On the wall, in large letters, were listed the Ten Commandments. His heart sank. He had thought he had been set free, but now, how could he keep all those 'Thou shalt nots'? He brought his despair in prayer to Jesus, and when he looked again, they seemed to read differently. Instead of 'Thou shalt not...', he read them as 'You won't...'

If we come to Jesus as Lord and Saviour, we too will find that not only are our sins forgiven, but also we are given new life in Christ; not only are we are released from condemnation, but also we are empowered by the Holy Spirit to live a life of love that is the fulfilment of the law (see Romans 13:10).

As week by week we have been studying these ten wonderful commands, we have been seeing them now, in the light of Jesus' salvation, not as a means by which God condemns us, but a pattern of the life God enables us to live. How wonderful is God's love for us!

Prayer: Lord, please help us to love you with all our hearts and to allow you to love our neighbours through us.

Thought for the day: Through the Spirit, I have God's laws written on my heart.

Loving our neighbours

Read Matthew 2:7–12

'No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends.' John 15:13 (NRSV)

While serving in Iraq in 2007, I awoke early one morning with an overwhelming feeling of dread. I prayed desperately that God would protect me and shield my family from the pain they would experience if I didn't return home. I wrote a letter to my wife and children and asked my operations officer to ensure my family received it if something happened to me.

Despite fear that made me sick to my stomach, we set out on our mission. On the outskirts of Baghdad, we were halted by the frantic Muslim chief of police with whom I had been working for over a year. He insisted we go no further because the road ahead was arrayed with roadside bombs. After further investigation we found that we had been set up for an attack, and our deaths had been averted by this unexpected messenger.

I still struggle with thoughts of that day, but I take comfort in the friendship that God placed in my path through that devoted and honest man. It would have been easy for him to let us drive past or for me to ignore his warning. My unlikely friend taught me a lesson about love and kindness that day. Our neighbours are often very different from us. God calls us to seek friendship, kindness and understanding even from those who appear different. Loving all our neighbours opens us up to great blessings.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, teach us to show kindness to strangers. Help us to treat others the way we want to be treated and to embrace all people as your children. Amen.

Thought for the day: God calls me to show kindness to everyone I meet.
